# 2023 Agreement & Waiver

We look forward to sharing garden space with you—please read through the community rules and agreements. If you have any questions, email [hello@bethlehemhouseofbread.org](mailto:hello@bethlehemhouseofbread.org).

- The garden is open starting May 13<sup>th</sup>. Returning gardeners and those who have paid 'rent' can make arrangements to plant earlier.
- Our garden is a pesticide-free zone, no synthetic chemicals (herbicides, pesticides or chemical fertilizers) are allowed. Organic fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides are permissible.
- Please conserve water. Beds are equipped with drip lines which deliver water automatically several times a week.
- Control the weeds in and around your bed, including adjacent pathways. Bindweed should be placed in marked barrels (not the compost).
- Use the compost bins or green barrels for garden debris. Do not leave weeds or other clippings in wheelbarrows or in piles in the garden. If bins are full, take your debris to the garbage dumpster in the corner of the parking lot. No food scraps from home.
- Keep invasive plants like mint, horseradish and lemon balm in containers, preferably on the sides of your raised bed.
- Children are encouraged in the garden but must be supervised at all times. Be careful of potentially toxic mushrooms that can spring up, such as rhubarb leaves. Pets are not allowed inside the fenced garden area.
- Corn and marijuana may not be grown at Bethlehem House of Bread.
- By the end of the growing season, clean up, cover crop, mulch or plant winter crops, to protect the soil over the winter.
- If you are out of town, have medical issues, etc. and need help, ask your garden neighbors, leave a request on the community white board, or contact [hello@bethlehemhouseofbread.org](mailto:hello@bethlehemhouseofbread.org).
- Tigard United Methodist Church and Bethlehem House of Bread are not liable in the case of an accident, theft or vandalism, or nibbling wildlife. Valuable art is at risk in the garden, so as much as we like the aesthetics, please do not display valuable art in the garden.
